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STUDY LEADER Don Gibbs



Donald A. Gibbs, Emeritus Professor of Chinese, began his teaching career at Harvard and later founded the Department of Chinese and Japanese at UC Davis. He also founded the UC Summer Session in China which took him to China every summer beginning in 1979. He is thus an eyewitness to dramatic changes in China as China has worked its way out of the political radicalism of the Cultural Revolution to the China that we will see on this trip. More recently he was the UC Education Abroad Director posted on the campus of Peking University. He is fluent in Chinese.

Upon retiring from academics, he developed a second career as a business consultant helping to introduce the

MiniMed insulin pump and other medical devices to China.

Don will be with our group at every step, offering informal talks and discussions covering, as he says, "everything from the ice age through the cold war and beyond." You will learn about China's contributions to world civilization, including the industrial revolution, and discover there is much more to this than you ever were taught in school.

Don will be accompanied by his wife Loretta who was born and educated in China and also served on the UC Davis faculty for twenty years. She will add a special dimension to the educational value of our trip.

Savor China's Exquisite Regional Cuisines




China today arguably produces some of the finest cuisine in the world. Given the country's stratospheric economic rise and the emergence of a fun-loving middle class, the special dining




experience is prized in Chinese society more than ever before. A good time in China means nothing if not "to eat well."

The enjoyment of good food will prove one of this tour's recurring themes. Fine dining certainly makes for a happy occasion, but in China, it means much more. Every Chinese region defines itself by its cuisine—this means the most direct way of experiencing a region is through tasting its food. In the Middle Kingdom, food unlocks the subtlety and richness of culture.

As your tour passes through much of the country you'll have ample opportunity to discover each region's culinary specialty. One after another, dishes brought to the table will surprise you by their presentation and uniqueness. It is this enjoyment of "food as culture" that will be part and parcel of your China



experience. Here are just some of the fine eating establishments you'll enjoy:





§ Your lunch with Beijing locals in their courtyard home in Houhai shows that all succulent foods need not be produced by five star kitchens. § And *Xiaolongpu* at the foot of the Great Wall showcases farmers' fresh produce and hearty foods—particularly braised meats—conducive to the northern climate and rugged terrain.

§ In GUILIN, Zuoan Restaurant's dishes seem inspired by the local love of bold colors and artistic contrast to create the "wow" effect.

§ In HANGZHOU, *Grandma's Kitchen* gathers the incredible array of Hangzhou specialties in one place and brings a delectable set to table. § Lunch at a *tea farmer's home* features the local approach to southern food with the unexpected and marvelous use of *longjing* tea.



§ In SHANGHAI, Lv Bo Lang is famous for its dim sum and masterful harmony of color, fragrance, and flavor. § Xi Family Garden Restaurant is often cited as one of the city's best choices for Shanghai cuisine and delicate sweet tastes.

Spend three days experiencing the grandeur of the Qing Imperial Resort at Chengde, a two hour drive north of Beijing.

A UNESCO World Heritage Site with a history of more than 300 years, this is one of the great cultural landmarks of all China.

The garden complex includes imperial halls, southern-style lake gardens, Mongolian yurts, and a wooded hillside with numerous pavilions. Beyond the palace many Buddhist temples were built, each one architecturally unique, of which five remain.

ITINERARY

October 19 - 20 • U.S. - Beijing
Depart the U.S. for Beijing. Arrive the next
day and transfer to the hotel. (meals aloft)
• Accommodations at Novotel Beijing Peace
Hotel located in the heart of Beijing.

October 21 • Beijing

After breakfast, visit the Forbidden City, the abiding symbol of imperial China, and truly one of the great achievements of civilization. Marvel at its expansive architecture, magnificent imperial gardens, and the many museums of Chinese antiquities and treasures within the complex.

Enjoy lunch at a local family's home in the historic Houhai District. Then, explore the picturesque lake district where many old courtyard homes are preserved amid narrow hutong alleys bordering tree-lined lakes. Tour the district by "pedicab" for a more lively experience of traditional Chinese life.

Visit the astounding National Museum by Tiananmen Square. The newlyrenovated museum has become an immense cathedral for Chinese art and

antiquities. The stone-clad atrium is a grand architectural space unmatched in the world.

In the evening, enjoy a welcome banquet at the luxurious China Lounge Restaurant featuring fine cuisine and famous Peking duck. (b,l,d)

October 22 • Beijing

In the morning, drive to the Great Wall of China at Mutianyu, a rugged section of the Wall that offers less crowded access (with cable car availability) and a more striking perspective as the Wall climbs and winds over the surrounding hills. Here the Great Wall of China presents a visual experience that consistently exceeds visitors' expectations.

Lunch is at Xiaolongpu Restaurant near the foot of the Wall. The restaurant is famous for farmers' fresh produce and unique local cuisine.

On the way back, drive by the Olympic Village and see the Olympic stadiums with their innovative designs. Herzog & de Meuron designed the National Stadium, known as the "Bird's Nest," while the firm PTW designed the National Aquatics Center, the "Water Cube."

Later, tour the Temple of Heaven, one of the finest expressions of the Ming dynasty. Built in the 15th century, the

stunning architecture of the Temple of Heaven represents the most advanced principles of mechanics and geometry available at the time.

In the evening attend a

presentation on contemporary society in modern China. Dinner is on one's own. (b,l)

October 23 • Beijing - Guilin- Longsheng After breakfast, fly to Guilin. Upon arrival, transfer by motorcoach to Longsheng.

Longsheng is famous for rice terraces cut into precipitous hills that farmers have cultivated since the Yuan dynasty. Skeins of luscious green rice plants create remarkable views throughout the valley. Longsheng is the home of Yao and Zhuang minorities who continue to don colorful dress and carry on their traditional life. Explore the village market and delightful craft shops.

Hike the rice terraces, and visit the locals in their traditional dwellings.

• Accommodations at Li An Lodge

Li An Lodge is a beautiful boutique hotel with 16 rooms created by an American-Chinese artist. The lodge is a work of art itself and displays the owner's art collection in every room.

October 24 •
Longsheng - Guilin
Continue to explore
the paths and life of
Longsheng until
early afternoon.
Then, motorcoach to
Guilin, world famous

for its spectacular karst limestone formations, vertical mountains thrust up from the seabed some 300 million years ago. Eroded over the millennia by water and winds, these picturesque mountains, immediately recognizable to anyone familiar with Chinese painting, have provided inspiration for countless Chinese artists.

Enjoy dinner at Zuoan Restaurant. (b,l,d)

• Accommodations at the Waterfall Hotel by the Li River

October 25 • Li River - Yangshuo

This morning, cruise down the Li River, winding past Mural Hill, Folded Brocade Hill, Crescent Moon Hill, and many more. The four-hour cruise navigates some of the region's most stunning karst formations.

After disembarking, tour Liugong & Mushang villages, a gorgeous agricultural valley surrounded by distant karst scenery. Walk into the fields to enjoy another experience of rural China, this time in the middle of a visual paradise.

Return to Yangshuo and wander lively Xijie West Street, filled with restaurants, crafts shops, and local inns. Xijie is the home away from home for numerous Westerners and so exudes a cosmopolitan air as well as an invitation for a rollicking good time.

After dinner, attend Zhang Yimou's colorful water show, *Impressions of Sister Liu Sanjie*. Zhang made numerous Oscar nominated movies such as *Raise the Red Lantern* and *House of Hidden Daggers*. He also directed the Beijing Summer

Olympics opening in 2008. After the show, transfer back to your hotel in Guilin. (b,l)

October 26 • Guilin - Hangzhou
In the morning fly to the ancient capital,
Hangzhou, the most elegant and beautiful city in China today.
This is the place
Marco Polo called

"paradise on earth."
Tour the elegant
Qing dynasty Guo
Zhuang Garden and
stop by charming
Quyuanfenghe Park.

Before dinner, tour the grand

architectural compound of the Qing dynasty merchant, Hu Xueyan. Countless courtyards lead from one to another, culminating in a grand garden with monumental rockery and idyllic pavilions.


In the evening, tour Xihuxintiandi by the West Lake, a beautiful lakeside park developed recently with gardens, fine restaurants and boutique shops. (b,l)

• Accommodations at Shangri-La Hotel by the West Lake

October 27 • Hangzhou

After breakfast, stroll through Huagang Park with its lovely flora and fauna, so representative of southern Chinese elegance.

Visit the National Silk Museum, where you will be amazed by the intricate production of silk.

At lunchtime, visit the Meijiawu Tea Plantation and meet tea farmers who continue the ancient art of *longjing* tea cultivation. Enjoy lunch at a tea farmer's home

In the afternoon, tour Lingyin Temple, one of the earliest grand Chan Buddhist temples remaining in China today.

temples remaining in China today. In the afternoon, hike up the small Gushan Hill by West Lake. Traditional architecture, landscape gardens, pavilions and museums line up the hillside with a bird's-eye view of West Lake and Hangzhou City.

Take a sunset boat ride on West Lake and tour the charming gardens on the isles.

Dinner is at Grandma's Kitchen where you will enjoy authentic Hangzhou cuisine. (b,l,d)

October 28 • Hangzhou - Shanghai In the morning, take the new high-speed train to Shanghai, a fun fifty-minute ride!

For lunch, enjoy delicious Shanghai dim sum at Lv Bo Lang Restaurant.

In the afternoon, tour Yuyuan Gardens, designed in six unique parts, making the garden seem much larger



than it really is. You will find one of the best Ming rockeries here, and wending the zigzag bridge to Huxingting Teahouse is a delight.

Dinner is on one's own.

In the evening, explore Xintiandi in downtown Shanghai. Designed by MIT architect Ben Wood, Xintiandi is a \$200 million "entertainment environment" with modern restaurants, clubs, cafes, and boutiques. Xintiandi proved so successful a model for urban redevelopment that it spawned dozens of imitators across the country. (b,l)

 Accommodations at the Jinjiang Tower in the historic district by the French Concession

October 29 • Shanghai

In the morning, tour the Shanghai Museum and view its wonderful collection of Chinese ceramics, paintings and furniture.

Lunch is on one's own.

In the afternoon, meet with the youngsters at a local primary school. Tour the Pudong economic district and ride the elevator to the top of the highest building in Asia, the World Financial Tower, for a bird's-eye view of the old and new Shanghai by the Huangpu River.

Meet with a finance expert to learn about how Shanghai is leading China's economic boom.

The rest of the day is free for personal exploration and last minute shopping.

In the evening, enjoy a farewell banquet at Xi Family Garden Restaurant. (b,d)

October 30 • Shanghai - U.S. After breakfast, depart for the airport and your return flight. Arrive in the U.S. the same day. (b, meals aloft)



Then, visit the crown jewels of the region, the Huang Mountains. The beauty of the granite precipices towering above the morning valley fog has provided inspiration to Chinese artists for centuries. On foot and by cable car, explore the Yellow Mountains' fabled views.

Later, see another imperial wish for immortality at the Han Emperor's Tomb.

Then, fly to Chongqing and visit General Stilwell's Museum. Enjoy the lively art scene at the Chongqing Art Galleries.

Board the Victoria cruise ship and travel downstream through the spectacular Three Gorges. Along the way, disembark to enjoy activities onshore.

Visit a relocated village and see the breathtaking Lesser Gorge, Danninghe. Experience the spectacular Three Gorges Dam at Sandouping, the largest in the world. Disembark at Yichang and fly to Shanghai.

The schedule will be demanding with moderate physical activity. Travel in China requires good physical condition and health (special needs must be arranged for in advance and may result in additional costs), a spirit of adventure, a flexible attitude, and a sense of humor. The itinerary is subject to change and modification. Every effort will be made to carry out the program as planned, but alterations may still occur. Participants should be aware that no refunds will be made as a result of unforeseen changes, modifications, or delays.

CONDITIONS

RESERVATIONS: Bookings are subject to the terms and conditions mentioned in these sections. By placing a deposit you agree to the terms and conditions listed herein. To confirm your reservation, a deposit of \$700 per person is required. Credit card payment is accepted for the deposit only; final balance must be paid by check.
